

The Road Not Taken

Introduction

This poem is written by Robert Frost, an American poet. This poem highlights the dilemma faced while making choices between available options. The poet advises the readers to choose carefully because once a choice has been made then we cannot revert back our decision.

Summary

One morning while travelling the poet reaches a wood. It is an autumn morning and he sees two roads running in different directions. He could not decide which road he should take. The poet examines the two roads. He finds that the first road bends down in undergrowth. This shows that it is less travelled. Then he examines the other and it is also grassy and untrodden. Moreover, both the roads are covered with leaves, signifying that no one has walked over these roads that morning. The poet is not deterred by the fact that both these roads are less travelled. He has to move on and for that he has to choose one of the roads. The poet chooses the second road and says that he will travel down the first road on some other day. However, he also expresses his doubts as to whether he would ever be able to return back here because one road leads to another. By saying this the poet wants to convey that decisions once taken cannot be undone. The poet says that in the years to come he will be telling about his dilemma to others with a sigh. It can be a sigh of relief that he had taken the correct road or it can be a sigh of regret because of a wrong decision made. Whatever the result, the poet is aware that his choice will affect his future life significantly.

Message

The poet wants to convey the message that choices and decisions should be made carefully because they have serious implications on our future life. He also says that one should not hesitate to make bold and wise decisions.

Short Answer Type Questions

Q 1. Where does the traveller find himself? What problem does he face?

Ans. On an autumn morning, the traveller finds himself in a forest where two roads diverge. He faces the problem of choice between the roads, because he cannot possibly travel on both the roads.

Q 2. What is intended by 'diverged'?

Ans. The poet had come into a forest where the path had split into two roads, i.e., one path has 'diverged' into two paths. The word 'diverge' conveys 'choice'. In our life, we are constantly faced with the problem of choice. Immediately, the poet understood that as a traveller, walking on both the roads is impossible for him.

Q 3. Why according to the poet, the second road has the better claim?

Ans. The poet has a free and adventurous spirit. On first inspection, the second road appears to be less

travelled and hence more challenging for the poet's spirit. Therefore, he says that the second road has a better claim.

Q 4. Explain the phrase 'way leads on to way'.

Ans. The poet says that one road leads to another, and then another, until you end up very far from where you started. Metaphorically, the poet realises that his desires of coming back and trying the other path some day may not be fulfilled.

Q 5. 'Once a road is chosen, the traveller has to move on.' Explain.

Ans. The poet says that once we choose a road we have to travel on it. We are all travellers in this journey of life. At every junction or at any stage in life, we are confronted with a dilemma when both the choices look equally promising and yet we have to choose one. Once a choice has been made then we have to stick with it. We cannot go back and choose something else.

Q 6. What do you think are the chances that the poet will come back some day and try the other path?

Ans. I do not think that there are any chances that the poet will be able to come back and try the other path. Life does not offer us a second chance. The poet had already made his choice and has chosen a road for himself. When he travels on that road, he will find that one road leads to another and it would be impossible for him to return to the starting point and start his journey on the other road. The poet wants to convey that choices or decisions, once made, are irreversible. We are stuck with them. We cannot go back and choose something else.

Q 7. Why does the poet say he shall tell people 'this with a sigh'?

Ans. The poet says that he would at some time in future, talk about his decision about taking the less travelled road with a 'sigh'. This 'sigh' could be of regret on making a wrong choice or it could be of relief because the choice that he made was correct.

Q 8. Which decision has made all the difference in the poet's life?

Ans. The poet had to choose one road which would help him in achieving his aims. The road chosen by the poet was less walked upon and less trodden. The poem does not clearly indicate whether the choice made by the poet made him happy or sad. However, if we examine the way of the world, we find that the individuals who have achieved recognition and fame have always taken an unconventional path. So, we can say that the poet's decision helped him to become famous and successful.

Q 9. After you have made a choice do you always think about what might have been, or do you accept the reality?

Ans. It's human nature to think what might have been if we had selected some other path. But it's also a fact that once we choose a path and cover some distance, there is no going back. One should think before making a choice. One should weigh all the

pros and cons of the choice. But once we make a choice we should be determined to move on. Regretting the choice does not help. Acceptance of reality motivates. I will definitely accept the reality.

Q 10. The title 'The Road Not Taken' is an appropriate title for the poem. Comment.

Ans. The title brings out the theme of the poem in which every person at some stage of life comes across situation where he or she has to make a choice. The decision taken to do things differently makes one stand out of the crowd. The title is figurative as the roads symbolise the dilemmas of life. The title 'The Road Not Taken' hence is fully justified.

Q 11. What is the central theme of the poem 'The Road Not Taken'?

Ans. The poem gives a clear understanding of the dilemma a person faces while making choices in life. The traveller in the poem faces two diverging roads. These roads are symbolic of the choices that a man has to make in life. His decision or choice of future action is of the utmost significance since the choices made by him shape his destiny. The poet, Robert Frost, through this poem, asserts the importance of the taking the right decision at the right time.

Q 1. Have you ever faced a dilemma in life where it had become difficult to choose between the two options? Describe the situation and the decision you finally took.
