Explanations

1. c Paranoid people are very secretive. Hence, 'paranoia' is the correct word.
2. d The departments are unaware of the Act. Hence, 'ignorant' is the correct word.
3. b The law is not working, hence it is 'ineffectual'.
4. a The correct word to be used is 'conceded', which means to admit the truth.
5. d The list has been handed over — 'forwarded'.
6. c 'is sailing down the Nile' is the correct phrase because the subject of this sentence is 'Cleopatra'(singular), not 'slaves'.
7. c 'how to read' is the correct phrase as the verb 'to know' cannot be followed directly by an infinitive ('to read'), but takes a conjunction, e.g. how, which, what, when, whether, etc.
8. c The definite article 'the' should be used before a superlative (best).
9. c The article 'an' should be used in place of 'a' before a word beginning with a vowel or vowel sound (antique).
10. c The correct adjective to be used here is 'derogatory', which qualifies the noun 'remark' in the given sentence.
11. c 'Since' implies a specific point of time, while 'for' indicates a 'generic span of time'. Hence, in this case 'for' is a better word to indicate a generic span of time.
12. a Statement (a) is correct. 'Rather' is redundant as they both (but and rather) mean the same. Also 'what' requires the verb 'is' in this case.
13. c When there are two plausible outcomes, the word 'whether' is suitable. 'I doubt whether...'
14. c Option (c) is the answer that gives the direct effect.
15. b Option (b) is the answer as it has the adverb('certainly') rightly placed.
16. c 'to tip off' means to give advance information.
17. a The meaning of the phrase — what is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander — implies that whatever is acceptable for the man should be acceptable for the woman.
18. c A 'rage' means a very popular fad.
19. b 'to knock down' means to sell off at an auction. A 'paltry sum' means a meagre amount.
20. d 'Through thick and thin' means that the two of them went through both good and bad times together.
21. c 'Prodigal' means extravagant while 'Miser' means stingy. These words are almost antonyms, just as the original pair.
22. d 'Catastrophe' is an advanced form of 'Misfortune'. 'Elation' is a higher form of 'happiness'.
23. c 'Molecule' is made up of 'Atoms'. 'Tissue' is made up of 'Cells'. Body is not made up of limb, but limbs.
24. c 'Limping' is an incorrect form of 'walking'. 'Stuttering' is an incorrect form of 'talking'.
25. c You 'solve a riddle', and 'unravel a mystery'.
26. b You can rely 'on' somebody, not 'over' or 'in' somebody.
27. c The action has to be a past continuous tense as the people were doing the action in the past. Hence, the phrase 'were playing' is used.
28. a 'understandable' is the correct option. The remaining options do not fit in logically.
29. b 'The conditional verb phrase 'would have' will be used here as the sentence puts a condition to 'his recovery', which is 'if he had taken the doctor's advice'.
30. d Simple present tense is mostly used to convey a habitual action. Hence, the verb 'migrate' is used.
