10. (b) When the poet learnt that he was in the presence of a snake, the poet had a mixed bag of feelings. He was fascinated watching the graceful and dignified snake drink water from his water-trough. It filled him with awe. The poet felt more honoured than terrified by the fact that the Snake had chosen his trough to drink water from. He considered the snake an esteemed guest who sought his hospitality. Even though the voice of education told him something else, his conscience told him that this particular type of snake is poisonous and he must kill it immediately, the poet waited for it to finish drinking water.

However, watching the snake leave filled the poet with a new found fear for his life and he threw a log at the harmless snake. Although the log did not hit the gentle creature nevertheless, it panicked and slithered back into the holes of the earth for safety. Now the poet was drowned in guilt and shame. He repented his petty act and felt that because of his petty act he will never again get the opportunity to be in the esteemed presence of the snake. In other words, the poet regrets that he lost his chance to be with the Almighty because he tried to harm one of his creatures who came to him in peace.

11. (A) (i) Anne is an extremely observant young girl. Having to live with seven other people, five of whom are adults, in the small confines of the 'Secret Annexe', gives Anne the opportunity to observe each and every resident. Through Anne, we readers come to the conclusion that petty minded people remain the same even in the most adverse situations.

Anne criticises the attitude of the grown ups in the Annexe in her diary saying that each of them acted more like children and less like grown-ups. They were constantly quarrelling about petty matters, acting selfishly, criticising others and saying hurtful things. Anne felt that love and compassion for one another, especially the children were missing from the Annexe. Anne writes that whenever she approached any of the

adults, they put her off by never giving her a satisfactory response. Mrs. and Mr. Van Daan, Mrs. Frank, Mr. Dussel and, on same occasions, her father too, failed to understand Anne's internal struggles. Anne feels frustrated at the adults and how they behave with her. It seems to her that the grown ups never allow the children to form opinions of their own. Anne wrote in her January 30, 1943 entry, "...I hear nothing but what an exasperating child I am, and although I laugh it off and pretend not to mind, I do mind."

Anne hoped that the adults would treat her with respect and listen to her opinions as well. She is old enough to make her own decisions and wanted the grown-ups to accept that.

11. (B) (i) Mr. Merton S. Keith was a teacher at Cambridge School of Young Ladies. He began tutoring Helen after her mother withdrew her from Cambridge School due to difference of opinion between Mr. Gilman and Ms. Sullivan. Mr. Keith taught Helen algebra, geometry, Greek and Latin. In order to prepare

Helen for Radcliffe, he gave her lessons five times a week, in periods of about an hour.

According to Helen, Mr. Keith was an efficient teacher. He was extremely patient with her and took as much time to explain the topics and mathematical problems, which Helen could not understand, as needed no matter how many times she asked him to repeat. Helen considered geometry and algebra to be more daunting subjects than languages and literature. It was Mr. Keith who made her fall in love with mathematics by making it simple and interesting for her to understand easily. Helen writes, "He kept my mind alert and eager, and trained it to reason clearly and to seek conclusions calmly and logically... he was always gentle and fore bearing." This boosted Helen's self-confidence a lot. However, Mr. Keith had trained Helen to solve mathematical problems mentally instead of training her to write examination paper. This caused Helen much unnecessary problems during her final examinations for Radcliffe.
