Summary

The poet's beloved has died. Her death has shocked him greatly. A deep sleep has closed off his mind. He is in a dream-like state, devoid of any common fears. He feels that his beloved after death has become a thing which cannot see or feel anything. The passing of time will no longer affect her. She has become a part of nature.

Message

The poet wants to convey the message that even though death is inevitable, it shocks the beloved of the deceased.
