Chapter 1 – Prehistoric Rock Paintings

EXERCISE

Question 1:

According to your observation how did the people of prehistoric times select themes for their paintings?

Answer 1:

- The people paint hunting scenes, various animals, their food gathering events, dance, and music, decorating bodies, other family scenes, and what they could find interesting around.
- For example, rock shelters at Lakhudiyar caves have prehistoric paintings.
 Men and animals have been painted in black, white, and red ochre.
- The painting is generally seen in drawn geometric patterns.
- The dancing figure of humans is also remarkable here.

Question 2:

What could have been the reasons for depicting more animal figures than human figures in cave paintings?

Answer 2:

Question 3:

Images painted, drawn or carved onto rocks and cave walls—which have been found across the globe—reflect one of humans' earliest forms of communication, with possible connections to language development. The most common subjects in cave paintings are large wild animals, such as bison, horses, aurochs, and deer, and tracings of human hands as well as abstract patterns, called finger flutings.

Question 4:

Other than Bhimbetka, which are the other major sites where these prehistoric paintings have been found? Prepare a report on different aspects of these paintings with pictures or line drawings.
