1. Last week, a wild elephant was radio-collared for the first time in Assam State Forest Department and World Wildlife Fund (WWF) India, it is being described as a step to study and mitigate human-elephant conflict. The department plans to collar at least five elephants in high-conflict habitats in the coming months. Experts say the exercise is challenging and runs the risk of low success..
2. What does it mean? Radio collars are GPS-enabled collars and can relay information about an elephant's whereabouts. They weigh roughly 8 kg identifying a suitable candidate (generally an adult elephant), darting it with a sedative, and fitting the collar around its neck before it is revived. Additionally, the team also attaches an accelerometer to the collar to understand what exactly the elephant is doing at any given time (running, walking, eating, drinking, etc.).
3. Why is it done? The objectives are two-fold, said M.K. Yadava, Chief GPS would help us track and study the movement patterns of the herd, across regions and habitats, he said. Added Hiten Ba e will know where they are moving, which corridors they frequent if the habitat is sufficient if it needs protection, and what is driving the conflict. The second objective is incidental: The collar would serve as an early warning system to people of elephant incidents, said veterinarian and elephant expert Kushal Konwar Sarma, who is involved in the exercise.
4. The Plan in Assam: In March 2020, the Ministry of Environment of Forest and Climate Change gave approval to collaring of five elephants in the nitpur and Biswanath districts. It sets a number of periodic reports. The Challenges: Collaring is an extremely time-consuming and challenging exercise. We have to identify the matriarch of the herd we will tag identification alone takes time and involves us stalking them for days, said the elephant expert Sarma.
5. For there to go on foot. There is a risk for very skilled experts on board who do the job with utmost care. officials said, not all components for radio collaring are available in India including collars and tranquillisation drugs. These have to be imported and are another challenge. Also, elephant's grown collars may become tight, so we usually take a senior elephant so there is less chance Baishya said, They will have it on for a maximum of six months before it falls off, id Bibhuti Lakhar, a senior scientist. Last year, an elephant, which had strayed into Guwahati from Amchang Wildlife Sanctuary in 2019, was radio-collared on a trial basis. We monitored it for a month, but due to the weight of the belt and the elephant brushing against trees, the signal was feeble and ultimately the collar fell off, aiding a forest official.
6. Is it worth it? Yadava said while there were risks and the success rate was low, there has been no better mechanism than collaring to study conflict long-term.

II. Read the passage given below.

1. Reading Comprehension (RC, as it is normally called) is the most peculiar section in almost all scholastic, entrance, and employment tests. The skills in RC make a lot of difference to one's chances of good grades/selection.
2. Most students find it difficult to tackle topics that are diverse from the field they are in or with whom they are comfortable. So one needs to develop a taste for even the most obscure and boring topic on this planet. For success in RC, one should be able to understand. And even with an average speed, one can succeed if one implements the strategies.
3. Broadly speaking, RC passages can be classified into a few categories. Fact-based RC is the simplest form of RC. These types of passages have a lot of information in the form of names, numbers, etc. In this type of passage, one should read very fast
4. Don't try to memorise any facts, numbers or names, etc. In fact, there is no need to even remember them. Just make yourself familiar with the structure of the passage. Just see in which paragraph the author is talking about what. Mark it. Then when you go to the questions, identify in which paragraph information regarding that question is mentioned. Go to that paragraph, read the numbers, names, etc. and mark the answer.
5. Inference based RC is the toughest form of RC. Here the passage is fairly tough to understand. This includes passages on topics like Religion, Spirituality, Philosophy, etc. Most of the students will be comfortable attempting these passages at least in RC. The reading speed is fairly slow in this type of passage. The way to master this type of passages is to read them again and again while practising.
6. Topic based RC includes passages on any particular topic like economics, astrology, medical science, etc. Generally what makes -these passages tough is the usage of technical terms. If a topic is new to us then the presence of technical terms scares us even if they are defined in the passage. For success in this type of passage we need to have a fair understanding of the definition of the term if it is defined in the passage. Read that definition twice if you need to. But don't worry about technical terms if they are not defined in the passage. Assume them to be non-existent and proceed. Key principle in these passages is that don't go to the next line unless the previous line is clear.
7. Reading passages first and then questions is the most popular strategy for RC. While answering the question you may come back to the passage to find the answer as you have just read the passage initially and not crammed it. But you should not come back for each and every question. If you come back for the majority of questions then you haven't read the passage properly. The key to success for this strategy is that you should understand the passage very well. We will suggest students to follow this technique from the beginning and work upon this.
8. Reading questions first and then passage is the strategy followed by a few students. They just look at the questions and not options. The objective is that after seeing the questions when you read the passage then you read only that part carefully where the answer is given. The flaw with this is that you will not be able to remember all the questions. Besides this, this strategy fails when there are questions that require understanding of the passage.

- i. 52 persons make up the first troop on the expedition, which is led by adventurer and knowledgeable Canadian Geoff Green. He began the "Students on Ice" project to educate teenagers about the current necessity for Antarctica's escapement. A Russian ship named Akademik Shokalskiy was sailing for Antarctica, the world's coldest, driest, and windiest continent. There were nine time zones, six checkpoints, three bodies of water, and at least as many ecospheres to pass on the journey, which started in Madras, 13.09 degrees north of the equator. They travelled for more than 100 hours in a mixture of a car, an aeroplane, and a ship before arriving at Antarctica's enormous white landscape and unbroken blue horizon, where immensity and isolation made them wondrous and tenacious.

- ii. The primary product grown in Champaran for commerce was indigo. All of the tenants were required by the British landowners to plant 15% of their land in indigo and turn over the whole indigo yield as rent. A long-term contract was used to accomplish this. The landowners then learned that Germany had created synthetic indigo. Currently, it is not at all profitable to produce natural indigo. The British landlords were very crafty in getting the sharecroppers' consent to pay them compensation in exchange for being released from the 15% commitment. While the other sharecroppers hired attorneys, many of them signed it voluntarily. The landowners used thugs. The illiterate villagers in the meantime learned about synthetic indigo.
