THE HEART OF A SEED

A. Pre-reading

Activity - 1

The teacher says to the students, "I am going to give you a riddle. Listen to me and then tell me " What it is."

Find me where I am.

If the students fail to solve the riddle after first listening, the teacher can repeat it and then ask them to guess.

Now listen to a poem. The title of the poem is "The Heart of a Seed"

B. Let's listen

- Students close their books and listen while the teacher reads the poem aloud.
- 2. Students open their books and look at the text of the poem.

The teacher writes the following questions on the blackboard. Then he reads the poem aloud. Students listen and answer the question on Blackboard.

- i) What is the poem about?
- ii) Say the words of the poem you remember.
- iii) Who said: "Wake and creep to the light" and who said; "wake".
- 3. Students read the poem silently by themselves.


