- 1. d If you read further, you will see that the context of the passage is talking about education and human development. Hence (d) is the best choice.
- 2. d 'Manner of description' is the right diction.
- 3. c 'To harness nuclear energy', we need the word 'possibilities'.
- 4. b Resources are meant to be 'utilised'.
- 5. a Clearly, the correct choice is (a).
- 6. b 'but' brings out the regretful tone.
- 7. d 'revitalizing' means that the 'existing' is being improved.
- 8. d 'full-fledged' fits in correctly as it emphasizes on the fact that insurance has gained itself an a place in business administration curriculum.
- 9. d 'many a' is the right usage. It means 'lots'.
- 10. c 'little' means almost none at all, and goes with 'no capability'.
- 11. c The paragraph deals with policy making by the government in different areas.
- 12. a If you read the passage further you will find that the government's problems are primarily scientific and technological in nature and need immediate attention. Hence, 'increasingly' is the correct word.
- 13. b Since the government's problems are primarily scientific and technological in nature, the word that fits in here is 'content'.
- 14. c 'foreign affairs' is the popularly used term, also most generically applicable.
- 15. b The only word to fit the blank is choice (b). The rest appear weak.
- 16. b Contextually, choice (b) is the most appropriate as we are discussing policy-making guidelines.
- 17. b 'entire' is the most appropriate word in this situation, as a big list is mentioned here.
- c 'seemingly' fits the context of the passage as it brings out the contrast.
- 19. b None of the other choices is good enough to fit the blank, 'profoundly' brings out the depth.
- 20. a The word 'quality' goes with the positive tone of 'pace'.
- 21. c Choice (c) is the most concise and has singular agreement between the verb and the pronoun.

- 22. b The right term is 'older in age than other mammals' and not 'older in age to mammals'. Also, (d) is incorrect because bat itself comes under the mammals category.
- 23. d Choice (b) is wrong as it uses your mind in the beginning but one's later. Choice (c) replaces 'this can' by 'this has'. 'This' introduces an element of certainty, which is absent in the original sentence. Choice (a) is wrong as it uses the phrase 'for long periods'. Hence, choice (d) is most appropriate.
- 24. a Choice (b) changes the superlative 'greatest' to 'great'. Choice (c) is wrong as it uses 'essay about' instead of 'essay on'. Choice (d) is wrong because when read in continuation with rest of the sentence, it would imply that the essay was on two different people, which is not correct. Hence, choice (a) is the correct answer.
- 25. b Choices (a) and (c) are wrong as in the second part of the sentences, we should say 'as in any other place'. Choices (a) and (d) also fail to specify where the peafowls were taken.
- 26. a 'AB' forms a mandatory pair as B describes the subject 'that' (mentioned in A) as a 'good enough reason. C follows B as the reflexive pronoun 'itself' (stated in C) refers to 'that' (subject). The correct sentence is - 'That would be a good enough reason by itself to switch to this system'.
- 27. b 'BA' is the opening mandatory pair as it gives us the subject of the sentence i.e. labyrinth of varying indirect taxes. This pair is present only in option (b), hence this is the correct option.
- 28. c B follows A in order to complete the verb form 'cannot be' (infinitive). 'CE' is a mandatory pair as the demonstrative pronoun 'this' (used in C) modifies the noun 'fresh delay' (mentioned in E). Hence, 'ABDCE' is the correct sequence.
- 29. d 'EA' is the obvious opener as it gives us the subject of the sentence i.e. some of our finest filmmakers. Hence, option (d) is the correct answer.
- 30. d 'ABC' is a mandatory sequence as C describes what the fashion shows have to don (fig leaf of propriety). 'ED' follows as it gives a reason behind this.
