Cloze Test

Developing vocabulary skills will also enable one to solve Cloze test. A cloze test is a paragraph from which certain words have been replaced with a blank. There are four words given for every blank. One has to choose the most appropriate word from the given options. Strategies for solving the Cloze test:

- 1. Read the whole paragraph alongwith the missing blanks and try to find out the main idea.
- Try to find out the connotation indicated by the author, such as whether the paragraph is positive, negative or neutral. This will give further clue in effectively selecting the words for each blank.
- Try to trace various linking words such as conjunctions and prepositions which give further clue regarding the type of word required for the blank.

Word Class: Prominence (noun), Level (noun), Standards (noun), Prestige (noun)

Function and Contextual Clues:: The word in the blank should reveal some quality that these institutions possess. This can be ascertained from the word 'national' which precedes the blank.

From the given choices - 'Prominence' means something that is particularly noticeable'. 'Level' pertains to an even surface, 'standard' refers to a benchmark or customs established by authority' and 'prestige' means reputation.

5.2 Cloze Test

The choices for the first blank are quite close. However, it is the next sentence that provides another contextual clue. It explains that the chosen institutions have not been supported consistently. Also, the first sentence presents the condition that only public universities can become world class institutions. Therefore, the government has recognized some institutions that have the potential. So the meaning of the given sentence is that institutions that have this potential or whose potential is clearly identifiable; such institutions have already been spotted by the government. Thus, out of the four choices 'prominence' fits best. 'Level, prestige and standard' do not fit because the government is not setting a benchmark for the institutions. In fact the government is only identifying the institutions that have the potential of becoming world class institutions.

Now, using the same approach fill the other blanks and complete the paragraph.
