




1. d From the venn diagram we can deduce that neither I nor II follows.



From the given venn diagram we can see only I follows.




Only I definitely follows. Some cycles may or may not be books.

- 6. c Choice (c) holds good again as, no definite conclusion can be drawn out of it.



9. d Each letter is coded by the number which represents it in alphabetical sequence and if the position is in two digits, then it is represented by a single digit (which will be sum of those two digits), i.e code for S = its alphabetical position, is

- 19. b Lov has 4 children.

For questions 20 to 24:

 \oplus and \otimes give the binary representation of the numbers 1 and 0. Arrange the numbers accordingly.

- 25. a The answer is CAMOUFLAGE.
- 26. d 'DC' forms a mandatory pair as in D the author states that consumers should watch out and C gives the reason behind the author's statement. Hence, 'DCBA' is the correct sequence.
- 27. c B is the opening sentence as it gives the subject of the passage i.e. low inflation rates and RBI's

decision to take measures for the same. This is followed by D, which states the measures. C follows D as it also refers to the measures. 'CA' forms a mandatory pair as both C and A refer to 'term deposit rates'. Hence, 'BDCA' is the correct sequence.

- 28. a 'BC' is a mandatory pair as B gives a problem and C states its solution. D follows C as the pronoun 'it' mentioned in D refers to the 'dialogue' mentioned in C. Hence, 'BCDA' is the correct sequence.
- 29. a A opens the passage as it talks about the 'negotiations', which is the subject of the passage and has been discussed in sentence B as well. 'BC' forms a mandatory pair because the phrase 'this assessment' stated in C refers to B. 'DE' forms a mandatory pair as 'the draft' mentioned in E was introduced in sentence D.
- 30. c 'AC' is a mandatory pair as C refers to the 'comfort' letters that have been previously stated in Sentence A. B follows as it states the Indian and Brazilian response to the US's demand for 'comfort' letters. Hence, 'ACB' is the correct sequence.
