**Stage 2****Reading****Activity 4.****Knowing the key words**

*twirling one's moustache* to turn the ends of one's moustache with the fingers so as to make them stand up

*jingling* to ring the bell on the ice-cream cart, so as to let children know that the ice-cream man had arrived

*sheaf of tasty green* a bunch of grass

The children read the story silently after the key words have been introduced.

**Stage 3****After reading****Activity 4.****Comprehension**

1. What does the expression "The cow wasn't going anywhere" mean? Why did the cow not want to move that morning?
2. Name all the people who tried to make the cow move?
3. Who was the youngest of all the people in the story?
4. The little boy 'began to grin' when he saw what all the grown-ups were doing. Why did he grin? Discuss your answer with a friend before telling it to the class.
5. What did the boy do to make the cow move?
6. Do you think the boy was clever? Why do you think so? Discuss your answer with a friend before telling it to the class.

7. Can you think of a different way to move the cow? Discuss with a friend before telling your answer to the class.
8. What is the 'lesson' that this story teaches us ?
