They may struggle to concentrate in class, become easily bored or frustrated and have trouble finishing homework or following instructions.

- 5. Customization: Homemade preserves allow for customized flavours and ingredients, enhancing meals with distinct tastes and textures.

Pickling is the process of preserving fruits, vegetables or meat by soaking them in a vinegar, salt and spice solution known as brine. This procedure contributes to food preservation by providing an acidic environment that prevents the growth of bacteria, yeasts and moulds that cause spoilage. The pickling solution's high acidity inhibits the growth of harmful microorganisms, extending the shelf life of the food. Furthermore, the salt in the brine drains moisture from the food, preventing bacterial growth and preserving its texture and flavour. The pickling process's combination of acidity and salt provides a hostile environment for spoilage organisms, allowing fruits, vegetables and meat to be safely stored for long periods of time without refrigeration.

5.3. Discuss any five factors affecting meal planning.

Solution

A number of factors influence meal planning, including decisions on what to eat, how to prepare it and when to consume meals.

The factors that affect meal planning are:

- 4. The Ujjwala Yojana seeks to reduce poverty by targeting low-income households and supplying them with subsidised LPG connections.
- 5. The Ujjwala Yojana seeks to increase access to clean cooking energy among underserved groups, particularly in rural and remote areas where modern energy services are limited.
- **7.2.** Discuss any five factors of gender discrimination.

Solution

Gender discrimination refers to as people being treated differently or having fewer opportunities because of their gender. Discrimination can occur in a variety of settings, including school, employment, healthcare, politics and social interactions.

The five factors of gender discrimination are:

- 1. Societal Stereotypes: Deeply ingrained societal assumptions regarding gender roles can lead to discrimination. These prejudices frequently dictate what behaviours, careers and interests are appropriate for men and women.
- 2. Unequal Access to Education and Employment: In many regions of the world, females are denied equal access to education, limiting their future employment opportunities.
- 3. Legal and Policy Frameworks: Laws and policies that discriminate against women on the basis of their gender exacerbate inequality. This could include restrictions on property ownership, restrictions on women's ability to work specific jobs or a lack of laws protecting women from workplace harassment or discrimination.
- 4. Lack of Bodily Autonomy: Gender discrimination can be seen in the control or restriction of women's bodily autonomy. This could include limitations on women's reproductive rights, forced marriage, female genital mutilation or denying women access to healthcare services.
- 5. Unequal Representation in Power Structures: Women's underrepresentation in government, leadership and decision-making bodies can result in policies and practices that benefit men.
- **7.3.** List any five guidelines of making a poster.

Solution

Creating an effective poster requires careful consideration of design elements as well as communication strategies in order to convey a message clearly and engagingly.

The main guidelines of making a poster are as follows:

 The message on the poster should be clear and concise, effectively communicating the core idea or objective. Avoid using too much text or information on the poster.

- 2. Design the poster to be visually appealing and attention-grabbing. Use vibrant colours, high-quality photographs and interesting graphics to draw readers' attention and make the poster stand out.
- 3. Organise the poster's content in a logical hierarchy to direct readers' attention and improve comprehension. To structure and highlight significant points, use headings, subheadings and bullet points.
- 4. Choose fonts that are simple to read from a distance, even in crowded or busy environments.
- 5. Maintain a balanced composition by carefully arranging items on the poster and ensuring an adequate distribution of white space.

8.1. List any five advantages of using convenience food.

Solution

Convenience foods offer several advantages, making them a popular choice for those with busy lifestyles.

The advantages of using convenience foods are:

Solution

Child abuse is defined as any act or omission by a parent or carer that damages or endangers a child's physical or mental health. It can encompass a wide range of behaviours, including:

- 1. Physical abuse: Hitting, kicking, shaking, burning or otherwise causing bodily injury to a child.
- 2. 2. Sexual abuse: Any sexual activity with a minor, including fondling, rape or incest.
- 3. 3. Emotional abuse: Insulting, insulting, threatening or otherwise endangering a child's emotional well-being.
- 4. 4. Neglect: Failing to provide a child with essential needs such as food, housing, clothes, medical care and supervision.

The following symptoms are seen in children who have been abused:

- 1. Withdrawal from friends or regular activities.
- 2. Changes in behaviour, such as aggression, rage, hostility or hyperactivity or changes in school performance.
- 3. Depression, anxiety or strange fears or a sudden loss of self-confidence.
- 4. Sleep issues and nightmares.
- 5. An apparent lack of supervision.
- 6. Frequent absences from school.
- 7. Rebellious or stubborn behaviour.
- 8. Self-harm or attempts at suicide.

Solution

Amit is suffering from ADHD.

List any other four signs and symptoms of this learning disability.

Solution

The signs and symptoms of ADHD include:

- 1. Impulsivity: Acting without thinking, interrupting others or having trouble waiting for turns.
- 2. Hyperactivity: Excessive fidgeting, restlessness or difficulty sitting still.
- 3. Forgetfulness: Forgetting daily duties, losing goods regularly or being unable to organise activities.
- 4. Poor time management: Difficulty with time perception, being consistently late or struggling to prioritise work.
