## **Determiners**

### What are Determiners?

- A determiner is a word which is used to modify a noun or a noun phrase.
- It is a word which provides context or reference to a noun.
- It can also show the quantity, quality, position or specificity of the noun.
- Various parts of speech can function as determiners to the noun.
  - Articles
  - Demonstrative adjectives
  - Numeral adjectives
  - Adjectives of quantity
  - Possessive adjectives

## **Articles**

#### **Definite Articles**

- Definite articles are used as determiners to express the specificity of the noun.
- They can be used to refer to singular or plural nouns.
- They can be used to refer to countable and uncountable nouns.

The man in the car wants to know where Hotel Piccadilly is.

There is a slight change in the temperature.

Mr Sreekumar knows where the files are.

Sharad is the captain of the team.

The ship sets sail from the harbour.

#### **Indefinite Articles**

- Indefinite articles are used to refer to the noun in the general sense.
- They are used to refer to the noun for the first time.
  - Example: There is a lady on the phone. (The noun phrase 'a lady' is mentioned for the first time.)
- They are used to refer to a particular group or class of nouns.
- They are used with singular nouns.
- They are used to refer to countable nouns only.

Mr Manekchand hired <u>a clerk.</u>
She is <u>a woman</u> of great strength.
There is <u>a difference</u> in the way she conducts herself.
Try <u>an egg</u> sandwich.
I want to buy <u>a cupboard</u>.

# **Demonstrative Adjectives**

- Demonstrative adjectives are used are words to point out a specific noun or noun phrase.
- That and This are used with singular nouns. Those and These are used with plural nouns.
- This and These are used to point towards nouns which are nearby. That and Those are used to
  point towards nouns which are far away.

Grace lives in <u>this house</u>.
Can you please clear <u>these plates?</u>
<u>Those bonbons</u> sure look tempting.
Manisha was talking to <u>that girl.</u>
<u>This book</u> is mine.

# **Numeral Adjectives**

- Numeral adjectives are words which specify the number of the noun.
- Cardinal numeral adjectives are numbers. (one, two, three)
- Ordinal numeral adjectives are numerical rankings. (first, second, third)

There were <u>five people</u> in the room.

Every <u>second building</u> here is painted blue.

Christopher is <u>three steps</u> behind you.

Complete these <u>two assignments</u> tomorrow.

The <u>tenth house</u> from the left is Mr Mahmood's house.

# **Adjective of Quantity**

Adjectives of quantity are words which suggest the quantity of the noun.

Little knowledge is a bad thing.

Most workers are paid less.

Several residents came forward to protest.

I have read every novel by Stephen King.

He had fewer friends by the end of his career.

# **Possessive Adjectives**

- Possessive adjectives are used to indicate the possession or ownership of a noun to another.
- They can be confused with pronouns, but they are actually adjectives.

My house is near the railway station.

The dog has injured its snout.

Kiran forgot her watch at home.

Swami was consulted for his wise counsel.
